"Change your life narrative," by helping reshape your perspective of yourself and the environment around you.

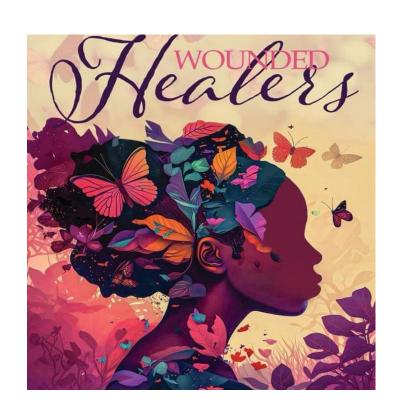
